It has been my greatest desire from before I can remember, my parents say when I was two years old, to become a Firefighter. I know this aspiration was given to me by God because it is so deep inside that it can't be removed. It has been my biggest dream for my whole life, but something that was out of my grasp because I was too young. No longer, I am excited to have been accepted at Eastern Oklahoma County Tech, where they have a course for high school seniors to learn about and gain certifications in Firefighting. I have been attending EOC since August and know so much more about Firefighting than I ever have, and I am even more committed to becoming a Firefighter. I plan to complete the Basic Firefighting coursework in May 2024, having achieved all certifications available, including Firefighter I & II, Basic CPR, Traffic & National Incident Management Systems, HazMat Awareness & Operations, Pro Board, and any others offered. After graduating from this program, I plan to take the EMT Academy at EOC. There, I will work toward all possible certifications, including Core Healthcare Provider CPR and National Registry for EMT Basic and any other certifications offered. I will finish this course by the end of September 2024 and plan to apply with the Moore, OK Fire Department, and others, hoping they will select me to be a part of their next Fire Academy. I am dedicated to becoming a Firefighter and am working toward that goal in all areas of my life.

During my time in TLUSA, I have served in several leadership roles: First Officer (3 terms), Second Officer (2 terms), and Troop Chef (troop created position since 2017). In these roles and throughout the Freedom Award and Servant Leadership Project process, I have learned many lessons that I believe will benefit me and those around me as I go out into the world. Two of those lessons are people & task management and public speaking.

While working as the First Officer for our Troop and during the Servant Leadership Project, I learned a lot about people & task management. One of the most significant things I learned was the art of delegation. I now know that a successful leader doesn't do everything independently; they find others who are good in certain areas and task them with jobs that need to be done. They pay attention to advice from those around them and look for ways to help those they lead grow into leaders themselves. I also learned that I do not need to "control" every aspect of what has been delegated to others, that many times, mistakes are the best way to learn, and that when given projects and space to do them without micromanagement, jobs can get done in even better ways than were initially expected. Allowing others to find ways to do the tasks

assigned while checking in on them to see how they are doing was a bit difficult for me during my project because I wanted to be more in the middle of it, hands-on. Still, I see now that stepping back and permitting my volunteers to use their talents is a mark of a good leader.

I was not excited to be the First Officer during my first term. In fact, I didn't want to be First Officer at all, but since our Troop was very small at the time, we were "voluntold" that each Navigator would have a term in each leadership position. Our Troop didn't have any Adventurers then, so the Navigators were called into the leadership roles. When the first week rolled around, and it was my turn to lead, my parents encouraged me to step up to the podium and just do it. It was very difficult for me and continued to be challenging for some time. I felt rather nervous every week and didn't want to speak to the group, but I kept at it, and after quite some time, I became more and more comfortable speaking in front of groups. Now, I am able to lead at meetings, MC Court of Awards, call flag ceremonies at meetings and in front of the church, speak in front of youth events, and more. Learning that I could speak in front of groups has given me confidence in this and other areas. I never thought that I would be able to be a public speaker, and while that isn't what I would want to do every day or for a job, I know that if I can do that confidently, I can surely do many other difficult things, if I will just keep trying.

Trail Life has been a very positive thing in my life. I started out as a Tiger in Cub Scouts and completed Webelos by earning the Arrow of Light Award. After Cub Scouts, we joined a Boy Scout troop, and after a short while, my dad said that Boy Scouts was heading down the wrong path, so he did some research and found Trail Life. At first, I had lost the joy of scouting organizations and really didn't want to go, but my dad went with us, and even when he was working out of state, my mom kept us going. I have gained so much during my time in TLUSA: skills in camping, outdoors, hiking, public speaking, and leadership; memories with my dad and brother; awesome friends who I hope never to lose touch with; confidence in myself and my beliefs, the ability to stand up for my beliefs and so much more. I would not be the person I am today without the influence of Trail Life and my dad. He has almost always been my leader, and I have learned so much from him. He taught me how to lead by leading by example, teaching me, showing me firsthand, and then allowing me to succeed, even if I made mistakes along the way. My dad is my role model, and I am glad to be growing into an honorable man like him.



First off, let's be honest. This letter is going to be biased. Lemuel is my son and I'm very proud of him. I could spend all day talking about him but I agreed with him to keep this to only one page.

Watching Lemuel grow up to become the confident, young man he is today has been one of my greatest joys in life. As the youngest in the family, we didn't call him the "baby" of the family. He was more of a twin of his 13 month older brother. Lemuel and his brother would do everything together, mostly had the same interests, except for one.

As a part of the Tech Ministry, I have worked with many people and learned how to use the equipment necessary to do the job. I have learned how to make my shots smooth as the pastor moves instead of choppy and how to keep the subject my focus instead of letting them walk out of the frame. This job does require focus, because it is easy to zone sometimes when the pastor hasn't moved much and the camera is staying steady in one place. If you don't focus you can miss the moment when he takes his glasses off and begins to move, then all of a sudden he is out of the frame and you have to hurry to catch up with him. I try hard not to let that happen as it doesn't look professional.

Most of the time the job is fairly easy, but I am happy to serve. There have been times when the job was more difficult, like when there is a play or Christmas event. During those times, there are many areas that need to be covered by the camera at the same time, and each of those areas are moving parts, so at those times, it takes a lot more effort to get the shot that is desired.

At times I have felt that my part on the Tech Crew was small and pretty insignificant, but I have since realized that I am a small part of a the larger Body of Christ and that what I do helps to make the service something that can be broadcast and viewed by others, bringing the Gospel message to those who might not see it otherwise.

I plan to continue to assist in any way possible with the Tech Ministry at Brookwood Baptist Church, for as long as possible. I look forward to the time when I move into more challenging rolls and training youth to fill the roll of camera operator, so that they can also see the benefits of serving.



Apologetics Training

I chose to work through the “C.S. Lewis Institute: Basic Apologetics Course” for one of my freedom experiences. This course consists of 20 – hour long lectures, given by Dr. Art Lindsley. Dr. Lindsley spoke about reasons for the Christian faith, objections to our faith, and how to respond to atheism, new age and cults. It took me a little over a month and a half to finish the course, which I did with my mom. We watched each lecture and went through the discussion questions. It took us quite a bit longer than the hour to do each lecture because we stopped many times during it to discuss what was being taught.

In the section about reasons for the Christian faith, I was really interested in the argument of “fine tuning” meaning that believing that we are just “lucky” that after millions or billions of years that humans would have been able to come into existence is statistically impossible and that there is every reason to believe in a Creator. In objections to our faith, it made an impact on me that Jesus is praying for us. This fact allows us to be more courageous, knowing that the Holy Spirit goes with us, but also Jesus is praying for us.

In responding to atheism, I found that if I know how to defend my faith and know not only my point of view well, but have studied their views, then I will not so easily be swayed or question my beliefs when someone “argues” or discusses their contradictory view with me. In the final section about responding to new age and cults, I learned that the new age movement believes that there is no objective truth, evil, right or wrong, but they also say that you should do good to others. I believe that idea can be countered by bringing to light that you cannot know what is good if you do not have truth, and cannot do good if there is no right or wrong. If everything is based on your personal opinion, whether a thing is right or wrong, good or evil, no one can know what is truly true or truly good.

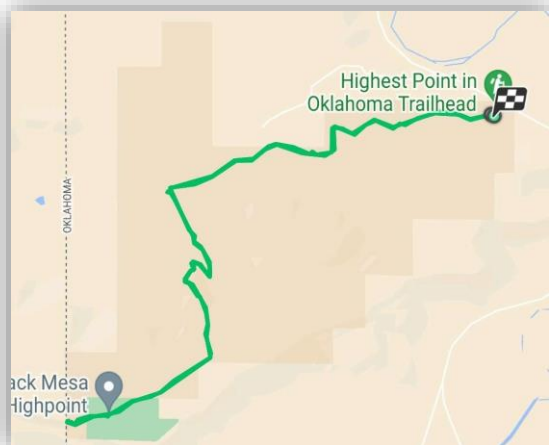
Foss Lake, March 2023

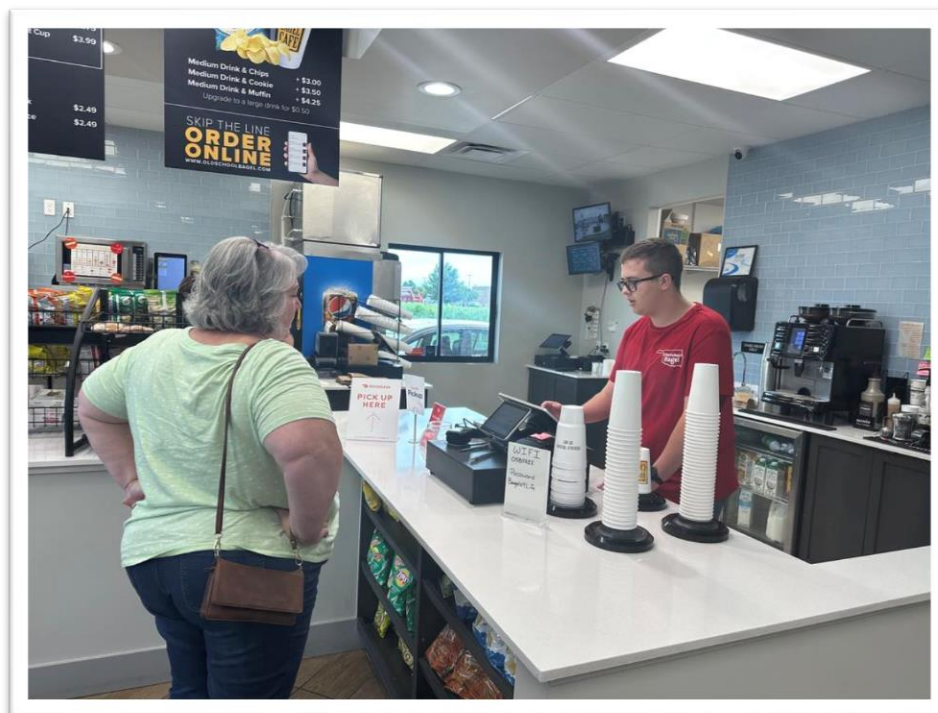

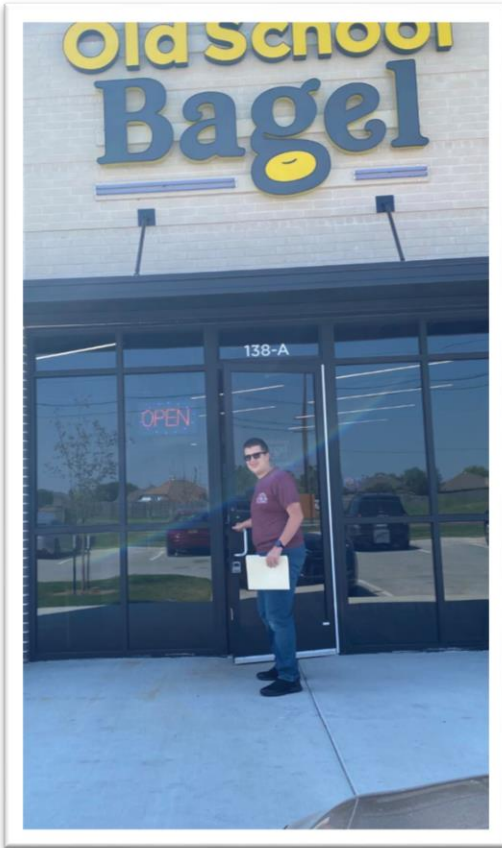

Unfortunately, I have now had to leave Old School Bagel because the work time conflicted with the time for Firefighter training at Eastern Oklahoma Technology Center.

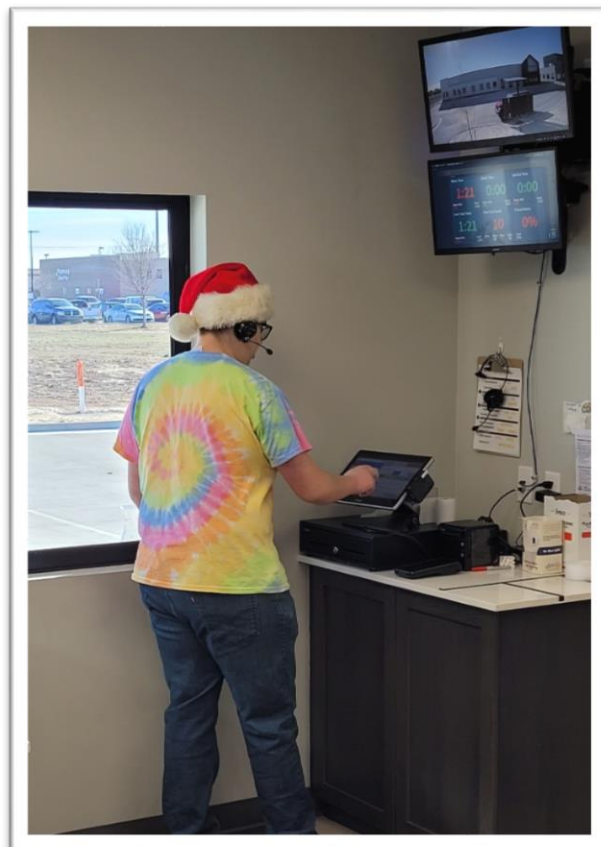



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

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Introduction

About Me

My name is Lemuel Kenney. I began scouting as a Tiger Cub in Cub Scouts when I was six years old, in August of 2012. I enjoyed my time as a Cub Scout and learned many new things while advancing through the levels. I looked forward to every meeting and wanted to do everything I could with my pack. I went to summer camp several times, along with many camping trips and a full schedule of exciting activities. My dad was the Cub Master, and I have many good memories of our fun times. I worked hard, earned all the ranks, and was proud to earn the Arrow of Light award as I finished up Cub Scouts.

When I became a Boy Scout in early 2016 after the Blue & Gold Award banquet, the experience was completely different from what I had in Cub Scouts. We tried several boy-led local troops; however, each Troop was so boy-led that the leaders were not teaching the boys how to lead, and instead of a positive experience, we were pushed aside. In contrast to Cub Scouts, the older "leader" boys talked and hung out. During this time, my dad began researching Trail Life USA.

In July 2016, we visited a Trail Life USA for the first time. We met Mr. Cory Carden, who was the Troop Master. The meeting times were filled with fun activities, and I began to love scouting again! I started as a Navigator, but at first, we were in with the Mt. Lions because there weren't enough boys for a Navigator group. I earned my first rank, Recruit, in August 2017 and quickly began earning badges and working toward my next level. I have served as 1st and 2nd Officer, Patrol Leader, and Troop Chef during my time in TLUSA. I am currently serving a second time as 1st Officer. I have learned so much since I served last time that this time, I can do so much more and feel like I'm helping my Troop grow.

Benefitting Organization

I began working toward the Freedom Award last year by working on experiences and am happy to start the process of working on my Servant Leadership Project. I began asking around earlier this year to find an organization that would benefit from a project. I have known about the Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children since I was very young. The Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Oklahoma City Campus "is a family-focused campus highlighting the Children's Hope program. Children's Hope was developed to help single mothers, who may have limited or no support/resources, and provide an opportunity to develop a solid foundation for herself and the children in her custody. Children's Hope aims to help families become productive and more self-sufficient by providing a safe, stable and nurturing place to live, while equipping, assisting and teaching important skills that support both the mother and the children."




I've had several friends who lived there and who went to my church. Several times, my family and I were able to volunteer during fundraisers like a drive-through nativity and bike race. OBHC is also the Charter Organization for our Troop, so I was excited to ask and find out if they had any needs. When I learned they needed yard games for the families and children there, I knew exactly what I wanted to do for my project.

Project Idea Summary

I plan to build a nine-square in the air, a Gaga ball pit, and a giant block stacking game for my project. These games can be set up and played outside in the yard or inside the gym area, giving OBHC the ability to have games for their residents year-round, providing a place of fun, and helping with stress relief and recovery from whatever the families have been through. Children's Hope has helped more than 300 families in the past ten years and impacted more than 550 children. The games should easily last over ten years if stored properly when there is bad Oklahoma weather. I believe that more than 100 people will be able to use these games per year. The Benefitting Organization contact is Brent Parsons, the Executive Director of OBHC, Oklahoma City campus. I will leave instructions for set-up/assembly and play so that when the games are stored, it will be easy to put them back up later, and so when new people come, they understand how to play the games.

Project Implementation Details

Project Tasks / Volunteer Time and Needs

-  Construct Nine-Square in the Air game using PVC pipes and connectors. This project should take approximately two hours to complete and use four volunteers.
-  Construct Gaga Ball Pit using pressure-treated wood and hinges with removable pins. This project should take approximately four hours and use at least five volunteers.
-  Construct a Giant Block Stacking Game and storage box. This project will be constructed over several work days due to the need to sand and stain each piece, taking approximately six hours and using four to six volunteers.

Volunteer Recruitment Plan

My plan to recruit volunteers is to entice the Adventurers and Navigators in Troop OK-0047 to participate in the project by asking during meetings, handing out flyers, and posting the flyers on the Troop Facebook page. I believe that I will have plenty of participation because the Adventurers and Navigators in my Troop are very involved. If, by some chance, I find out that many of them will not be able to attend, I will ask my friends at church for their help.

Proposed Work Schedule

I will need two work days to complete this project. On the first workday, we will cut, sand, and stain the wood pieces for the Giant Block Stacking Game and construct the storage box. On the second workday, we will finish the Giant Block Stacking Game by waxing the parts so they move smoothly. We will cut and assemble the Nine-Square in the Air and the Gaga Ball Pit.

Work Day One

Proposed date: September 30

Location: My house

I plan to have a group of four to six volunteers or more if available, as many hands make light work. The other volunteers will mark each board where it needs to be cut. I will have my brother, Shiloh, who is 18 and a Freedom Rangler, cut the wood because Trail Life does not allow boys under 18 to use this kind of power tool.

We will also sand and stain these wood pieces so that they will be ready for waxing on the second workday.

Work Day Two

Proposed date: October 7

Location: Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children

I plan to lead the volunteers in constructing the three projects. I will divide the volunteers into three groups, each working on a different project, as follows:

- Waxing the wood pieces for the Giant Block Stacking Game. This project will not take very long, so I will reassign these volunteers to one of the other project groups when this job is complete.
- Cutting PVC and assembling the Nine-Square in the Air Game. The PVC pieces must be measured carefully and marked; one volunteer will use a PVC cutting tool to cut each marked piece to the correct length.
- Cutting wood and assembling the Gaga Ball Pit. Each piece of lumber will be carefully measured and cut to the proper lengths; then, all will be built.

Backup Work Day

Proposed date: October 14

Location: Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children

This backup day will only be used if the work cannot be completed on the other work days.

Proposed Work Day Schedule

8:00-8:30 – Arrive – Donuts available; spend a few minutes talking and preparing for the day.

8:30-8:45 – Project Summary / Devotion – I will gather the volunteers as a group, go over what we will be doing that day, lead a short devotion and pray over our work.

8:45-12:00 – Work on project tasks.

12:00-12:45 – Lunch

12:45-? – Continue working on the project until it is either done or when volunteers must leave for the day.

Work Day Plans / Diagrams

We will begin building the Giant Block Stacking Game on the first workday. This game involves fifty-four wooden pieces that are stacked into a tower. The game's object is to remove a block from the tower and then place it on the top level without causing the tower to fall. This game will be oversized and stand about three feet tall when assembled. We will include a six-sided die that will be stained to coordinate with the colors that the blocks will be stained, giving the game multiple ways to be played.

Giant Block Tower Stacking Game Construction Details

- Carefully measure and mark every 7 ½" on 2"x3"x8' boards for a total of 54 – 2"x3"x7 ½" pieces (actual size will be 1 ½"x2 ½"x7 ½") (Figure 1) These will be marked and cut one at a time to avoid size difference between boards.
- Cut 54 pieces using a miter saw.
- Sand each block smoothly using a hand sander or belt sander.
- Carefully measure and mark 4 – 1"x8"x19 ¾" pieces (actual size will be ¾"x7 ¼"x19 ¾") and 2 – 1"x8"x13" (actual size will be ¾"x7 ¼"x13") (Figure 1).
- Cut boards.
- Carefully mark 1"x8"x19 ¾" boards with drill holes as shown on the following pages. Holes should be about 3/8" away from the side and evenly spaced (Figure 2).
- Drill holes for the screws.
- Add a bead of wood glue along one of the side pieces and screw to one bottom piece using a 1 ¼" screw (Figure 3)
- Add a bead of wood glue to the short side piece and attach it with 1 ¼" screws (Figure 4)
- Repeat on the opposite side.
- Attach another bottom board right by the other bottom board and secure it to the short side pieces using 1 ¼" screws (Figure 5).
- Attach the last long sideboard with wood glue and 1 ¼" screws (Figure 6).
- Attach handles, one on each short side (Figure 7).
- Remove any excess glue that squeezes out as you go.
- After the glue has dried, sand crate smooth.
- Cut a 4"x4" cube (actual size will be 3 ½"x3 ½"x 3 ½") (Figure 1).
- Cut the remaining 4" x 4" post into 6 – 15" pieces, which will be used for painting.
- Set out the tarp and leftover 4x4 post pieces.
- Each painter will set out their blocks on their post-piece.
- Condition all wood pieces, following instructions on the can.
- Stain 9 blocks of each of the 6 colors, following instructions on the can.
- Stain each of the 6 sides of the 4x4 die a different color.

Giant Block Stacking Game **Set-Up Instructions**

- Empty carrying crate and turn it bottom side up.
- Build up the block tower.
 - 3 blocks on each row.
 - Start a new row of 3 blocks, rotating the block direction.
 - Alternate colors randomly
 - Repeat until you have 18 rows.

- Sand cut edges of PVC so there are no sharp edges
- Connect pieces (Figure 2)
- Make sure all is secure and done properly
- Disassemble and store connectors in bags and PVC pipe with straps

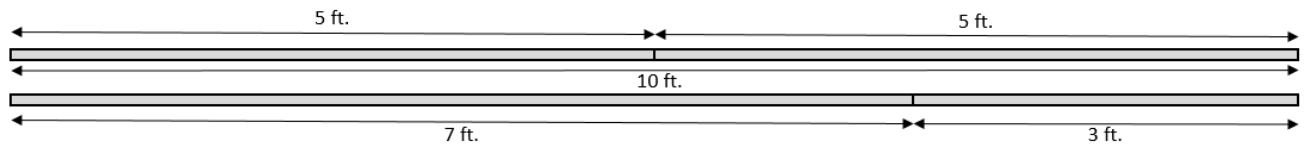
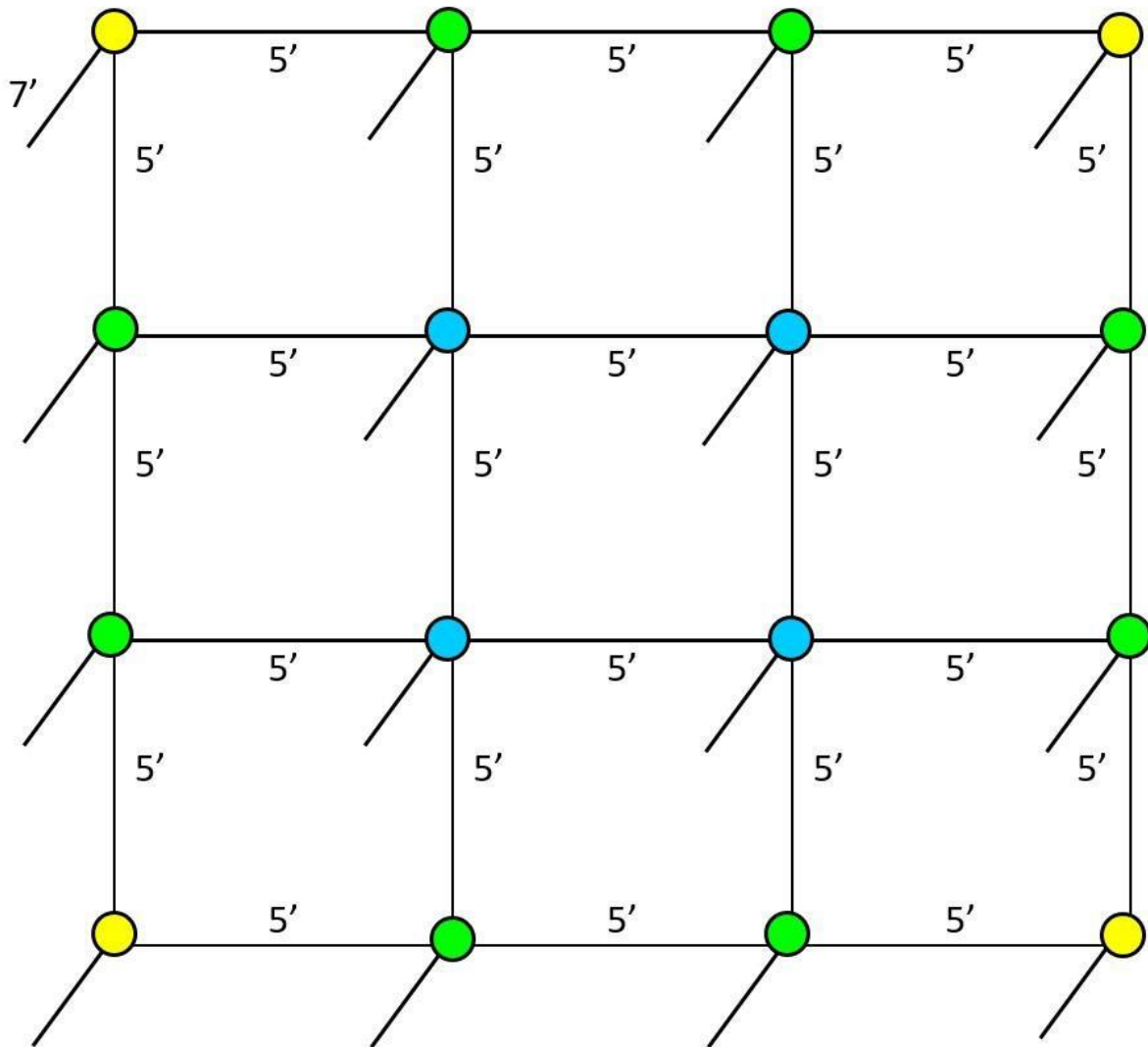

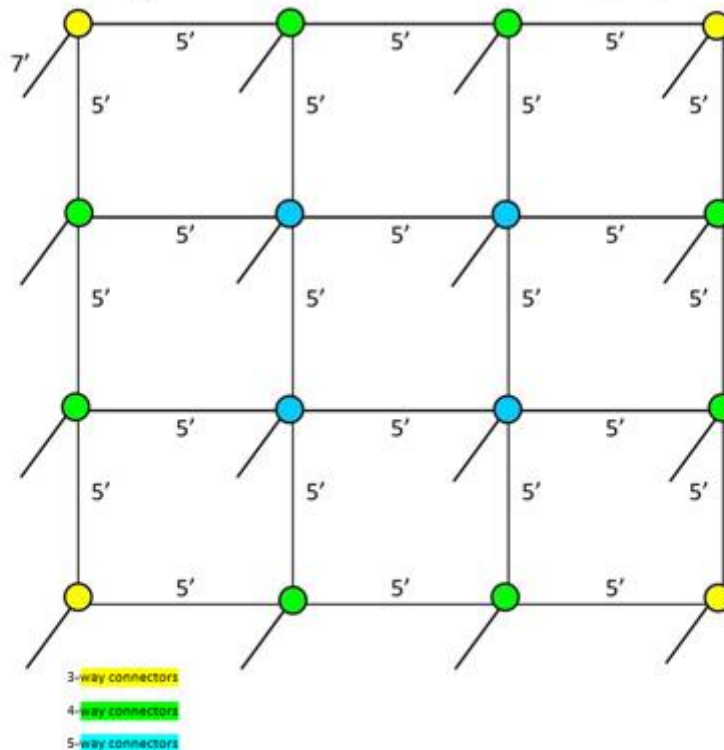

Gaga Ball Pit Construction Instructions

- Carefully mark - 1"x4"x8" boards with a mark at 30" (1 at 26") (Figure 1)
- Check measurements before cutting
- Carefully and with supervision, use the miter saw to cut boards
- Mark, check, then cut to make 23 – 30" and 1 – 26"
- Make side with entrance using the following directions:
- Gather 4 – 1"x6"x8' boards (Figure 2)
- Lay out 4 – 1"x6"x8' boards with approx. 2 in. spaces between them (Figure 3)
- Measure and mark 1 - 1"x6"x8' board as shown (Figure 4)
- Lay out 3 – 1"x6"x8' boards and 2 pieces cut in last step as shown with 2 – 1"x4"x30" & 1 – 1"x4"x26" pieces as shown (Figure 5)
- Using wood screws, screw 4 into each intersection, placed as shown (Figure 6)
- Measure and cut 1 - 1"x4"x8' board as shown (Figure 7)
- Make 7 sections using the following directions:
- Gather 28 – 1"x6"x8' boards (Figure 2)
- Lay out 4 – 1"x6"x8' boards with approx. 2 in. spaces between them (Figure 3)
- Lay out 3 – 1"x4"x30" boards on top of the 4 1"x6"x8' boards, space evenly (Figure 8)
- Using wood screws, screw 4 into each intersection, placed as shown (Figure 9)
- Turn the board over and place 2 more screws, placing them as shown, making sure not to hit screws already in on the other side (Figure 10)
- Repeat steps until there are 7 sections made
- Using wood screws, screw boards on, place as shown (Figure 11)
- Turn the board over and place more screws, placing them as shown, making sure not to hit screws already in on the other side (Figure 12)
- Attach hinges to top and bottom boards (Figure 13)
- Arrange panels, making sure you have a 135° angle to make an octagon (Figure 14)
- Pins on hinges are removable to allow for the game to be disassembled, moved, and stored

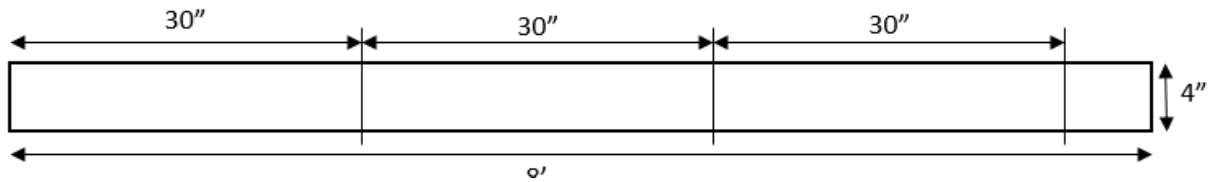

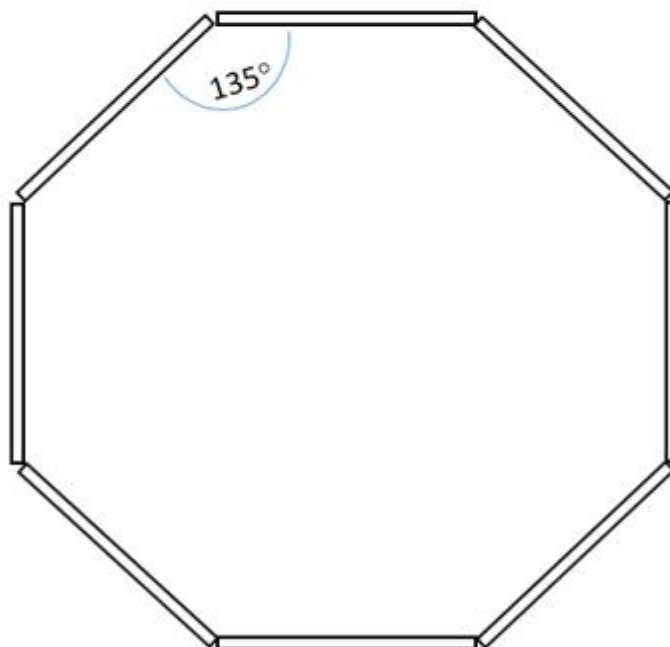
Gaga Ball Pit **Assembly Instructions**

Gaga Ball Pit **Play Instructions**

- The goal of Gaga Ball is to be the last person in the pit.
- All players start inside the pit with one hand touching a pit wall.
- There can be as few as 2 players or as many as can fit in the pit while still touching the wall.
- The game begins when the referee, who is outside the pit, throws the ball into the center of the pit.
- When the ball enters the pit, the players shout “Ga, Ga, Go!” then the ball is in action.
- Players can then hit the ball with an open or closed hand.
- If the ball touches a player below the knee, even if the player hits them self with the ball, they are out and leaves the pit.
- If the ball is caught on a fly, the player who hit the ball is out.
- Players can not hold the ball.
- If you hit the ball out of the pit, you are out.
- If the ball touches you on or below the knee at any time, you are out.
- A player may only hit the ball one time until it touches another player or the wall, or they are out.
- A player can bounce the ball off the wall to reposition it, then hit it again.
- Players can move around anywhere in the pit at any time.
- Players may not sit on the wall.
- Another ball can be added for a more challenging game.
- Variations are acceptable, as long as rules are decided and agreed upon before game play.

Leadership Details

I plan to organize the volunteers and divide them into three job tasks. I will start with one group and show them what I expect, then move to the next group, showing them instead of telling them what to do. Finally, I will move to the final group and show them what to do. I will print plans for each project and give them to the groups. I will assign a leader for each group. These leaders will be the experienced Adventurers that are able to attend that day.

I will have a sign-in/sign-out sheet to track who is present, their assigned job, and when they begin and end work.

If I have too many volunteers, I make a fourth group that will be assigned to clean up after the other groups or clean around the grounds of the Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children. Some gardens can be cleared of weeds, and other chores can be done.

If my volunteers are goofing off, I will ask them nicely to get back to work. If they continue goofing around, I will ask an adult leader for help, and if they do not listen, I will sign them out and let them know that they are done for the day.

If volunteers are arguing, I will separate them into different tasks. If they are arguing with me, I will ask an adult leader for help, and if they continue arguing, I will sign them out and ask them to leave.

If I forget any equipment, I will ask one of my parents or siblings to head home and get the forgotten tool. I will make a list of everything that is needed beforehand and work hard to ensure everything that should be there is there and that nothing is forgotten.

Suppose any volunteers, youth or adult, try to take over leading. In that case, I will take them aside and respectfully remind them that the Freedom Servant Leadership Project is a very important project for me and that it is required that I lead the project to fulfill the requirements of the Freedom Award. 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Introduction

Benefitting Organization

Serving the Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Oklahoma City Campus has been my honor. The Children's Hope program was established to help single mothers with inadequate or no support/resources and allow them to cultivate a solid foundation for themselves and their children. The Children's Hope program aims to help families become fruitful and more independent by providing a safe, stable, and nurturing place to live while training, supporting, and educating them in essential skills that assist both the mother and the children.

The Executive Director of OBHC, Oklahoma City campus, is Brent Parsons. Children's Hope has helped more than 300 families in the past ten years and impacted more than 550 children. The games should easily last over ten years if appropriately stored during inclement weather. I am confident that more than 100 people will be able to use these games annually.

Project Descriptions and Expectations

My goal was to leave the OBHC with games that could be played and enjoyed for years, hopefully, decades. During my Project, we built a gaga ball pit, a giant block stacking game, and a high-quality nine-square in-the-air game. These games can be set up and played outside in the yard or inside the gym area, giving OBHC the ability to have games for their residents year-round, providing a place of fun, and helping with stress relief and recovery from whatever the families have been through.

Fundraising

Fundraising was a struggle for me. I have a very hard time asking people for money or support in this way, so this part of the Project really got me out of my comfort zone. I had planned a spaghetti dinner fundraiser initially but decided to change to a pancake breakfast. This was because of the time of year and knowing that most people would attend local high school football games on Friday night. I wanted to have a decent turnout, so I decided to change to Saturday morning before the college football game was on TV. I did several other fundraisers, and over the course of all the fundraisers, I was able to earn enough to complete the Project. The following paragraphs will detail each of the fundraisers.

Crowdfunding

I put out a flyer on Facebook and asked in person at Trail Life and AHG meetings for those willing to donate to the Project using PayPal, CashApp, Venmo, or cash/checks. Through this effort, I collected \$360.00, which was \$140 less than I had projected.



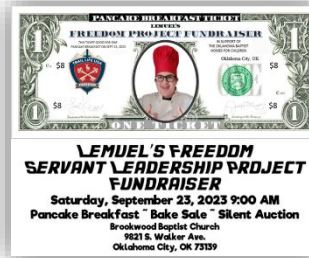
Cookie Dough

I sold tubs of cookie dough made by my mom for \$10 each. There wasn't as much interest in this fundraiser as I had thought there would be; my thought is that because school had just started and people were involved in similar school fundraisers, which made my fundraiser less appealing. I was able to make \$70 from this fundraiser, which was far less than I had projected at \$500.



Pancake Breakfast/Tips

The pancake breakfast was the most successful fundraiser; however, it was still not as profitable as I had anticipated. I thought this would be more successful based on how many people had attended my brother's fundraiser; however, I didn't consider the time of year and believe that people may have been out of town for football games or the end of the summer trips. I had projected \$500 from the spaghetti dinner and made \$401.36.



50/50 Raffle

I had not intended to do a 50/50 raffle, but because my brother had done this and several people said they were excited to participate in the raffle, so I decided to go ahead and do it. The way the raffle works is that people buy a ticket for \$1, and when the drawing is over, the person with the winning ticket receives 50% of the amount collected. I was lucky that the winner decided to donate their winnings back to the Project. The total earned was \$29.



Bake Sale

We sold Rice Krispy treats, chocolate cover pretzel rods, and chocolate bars at the bake sale. We did this bake sale during the pancake breakfast and Trail Life meeting times. I made slightly more from this fundraiser than the expected \$30. My total was \$38.



Silent Auction

I had almost no donations to the silent auction besides contributions from my family. By the day of the silent auction, I assumed I would make very little from this fundraiser. Mr. Rhett Butler was the only other person to donate to the auction with a military playset and an R2D2. Most of the things in the silent auction were items that we found at home that we thought might bring some money. My dad donated three sizes of ammo cans and a laptop computer that he had fixed up. My mom donated four Ayn Rand books, a necklace, and several large bags of candy. My grandma donated some crochet coasters, and my sister donated curtains that she hadn't used. Surprisingly, I made more on this fundraiser than the projected \$250. This fundraiser earned \$312.



Wands

My mom had supplies for “Harry Potter” type wands and spent several days making 18 wands to sell at \$10 each. Only two sold for a total of \$20 for this fundraiser.

Material Donations

I called/went in person to five Lowe's/Home Depot's asking for donations for the materials that they carried in their stores. I wrote a request letter and created a list for each store, including the item, model/item #, and the price it was listed online. I went in full uniform and asked to speak to the manager to make my request. At four of the stores, I was met with “NO” for an answer. Some were kind in turning me down; one was not. However, at Lowe's in Moore, OK, I was met with a “YES” to all the things on the list that were not wood or PVC. This task was the most difficult for me because I absolutely hate asking for things for free. My mom and dad encouraged me, and my mom went with me for support. I was happy to receive \$140.51 worth of material donations.

Preliminary Work

I found my Project Description Report most helpful before my project days. Because the report was so detailed, I had the shopping list and all the other information I needed to prepare for the Project. On September 29, I went shopping with my mom and brother, Shiloh. I borrowed my sister's car, a Ford Expedition because none of our vehicles could fit the length of the wood needed. We put a tarp down so the wood wouldn't mess up the inside of the car. First, we went to Lowe's to pick up the donations and were able to purchase some of the wood there; however, they did not have ground contact/pressure-treated lumber in the correct sizes for the gaga ball pit, so we had to go to Home Depot for the rest of the supplies. Luckily, Home Depot did carry the lumber we needed.

I went to the 9 Square in the Air website to purchase the connector pieces so they would arrive before my second work day. The website had a spot that said you could apply for a discount for churches and non-profit organizations. Since the OBHC is a non-profit, I applied for a discount. I was approved, but the discount was not what I had expected. I had thought I would get a percentage off my order, but they sent \$150 off of the deluxe game kit. When this discount code came, I began to rethink my plans. The price difference between purchasing the items to build the game ourselves compared to purchasing the kit was \$60.12. I weighed the pros and cons for each scenario, talked to my parents, and decided to purchase the kit through 9 Square in the Air. While building it ourselves would have been slightly less expensive, the quality of the game that we could purchase is significantly higher. The purchased game has pieces that snap together instead of just fit together, meaning the pieces wouldn't work their way out of the connectors during play as the game sways back and forth. The purchased game has height-adjustable legs, so if the OBHC wants to set the game up for smaller children, they can play more easily. The purchased game also came with high-quality storage bags for each of the game components. The amount of time that would be used to construct this game would have been minimal since all that would have been needed was to mark and cut the PVC pipe to length with a PVC pipe cutter, which would have taken less than 30 minutes. Considering all the benefits of the kit, I decided that I wanted to provide the best possible quality product for the OBHC and, therefore, decided to work my hardest to save money in other areas, mostly donuts and pizza, so that we would be able to afford the purchased kit.

I purchased the hinges on Amazon, which were supposed to arrive on October 4 and cost \$120.80; however, they were delayed, and I went to Lowe's and found other hinges and better screws, which I purchased for \$74.88, saving us \$45.92.

Description of how the Project unfolded

Summary of Each Workday

September 30, 2023

Giant Block Stacking Game and Wood Box

I asked my dad and brother to help me set up tables, a canopy, and the miter saw station before the workday began. I sent my mom and brother to get donuts and ice. My fellow Trailmen began arriving around 8 a.m. We had a time of eating, a short motivational speech, and prayer. After this, I had a safety briefing and let my volunteers know what the Project was and how it was to be completed and broke them up into groups.

I had my brother, Shiloh, use the miter saw since he was already 18 and a registered adult. I placed Caleb on measuring. He worked directly with Shiloh to make sure the wood was measured and cut accurately. Peter and Lucas used hand sanders to make sure each of the pieces was smooth. Henry and Gibson were assigned to stain the wood after the wood was sanded.

When Caleb and Peter finished their first jobs, they went on to build the box that would store the game pieces, and Shiloh and Lucas moved to help with the staining. Each one of the volunteers worked diligently in their assigned tasks. The staining was rather messy. I provided disposable gloves for those working with the stain; however, Henry managed to cover himself in the stain. He didn't seem concerned, but I wondered what his mom would think.

This day went very smoothly, and our only issue was when the box was being built by Caleb and Peter; they didn't follow the order of instructions, and I had to ask Mr. Sean Kinner to step in with his woodworking abilities and help get them back on track. During the box assembly, one of the pieces of wood split a little; however, the box still went together well and will still work well for the application. We were able to finish the whole game construction right at noon, which meant we saved money on lunch.





October 7, 2023

Gaga Ball Pit Construction/Nine-Square in-the-air Set Up

As I prepared for this day, I had my family help me to get everything we would need into the vehicles we would be driving or stacked and ready to go in the morning. I realized as we got everything together that I had forgotten to get several gaga balls, so I planned for that to be taken care of. I had arranged with Mr. Kinner to stop by my house on his way to the OBHC to pick up the wood, miter saw, etc., since he has a truck. In the morning, when everything was ready, I left with my mom and headed to the donut store to purchase breakfast. We then headed to the worksite with all the supplies that could fit in that car so I would be there first and have everything as set up as possible before the volunteers arrived. My dad and brother stayed at my house to help Mr. Kinner load the supplies that would be brought.

As soon as we arrived at the OBHC, Gibson came over to meet us, and we also met Sylvia, who opened the building for us so that we would have access to restrooms and a place to eat. Hudson and Noah arrived at 8 a.m., and we quickly began eating donuts and enjoying each other's company while we waited for the rest of the volunteers. The rest of the supplies arrived at 8:30 a.m., as well as Peter, Lucas, Jonathan, and DJ. I was happy also to know that Mr. and Mrs. Kinner would be able to stay because they have great expertise in woodworking, which I believed would come in very useful.

DJ, a good friend from church and an Eagle Scout led the group in a devotion, then I gave a safety briefing as well as explained the Project, and we began working on the Gaga Ball Pit. At this point, I asked my mom to head to Walmart to get several Gaga balls so that the game could be played on completion, and I asked her to also pick up some soda for lunch because I knew that we would be working longer this day than the previous.

I had Hudson work with Shiloh at the miter saw. Shiloh was cutting the wood, and Hudson was holding it still for him since the pieces were quite long. DJ and Noah were assigned to measure and mark the pieces. Peter measured all the pieces after they were marked to make sure that they were correct. Jonathan was assigned to take the staples out of each piece of wood. Lucas and Gibson were runners helping where needed.

Once the wood was cut, then we began to assemble the Gaga ball pit. Mr. Kinner suggested we make a block the size of the gap needed so that we could make sure that each of the gaps was exactly the same. We realized that the instructions were not 100% accurate, so the middle gap ended up being slightly larger than the top and bottom gap; however, because of Mr. Kinner's suggestion, all of the sides were the same, and the game turned out to look very nice.

There is one side of the Gaga ball pit that is different from the other seven sides because there needs to be a place for people, especially smaller children, to climb in and out of the game. This side was rather more difficult than the other seven sides, and I asked for technical help from Mr. Kinner for this process. I was very grateful for his help, as well as Mrs. Kinner, on this, and I realize that we wouldn't have been able to easily complete this side without them.

I sent my mom and brother, Shiloh, to pick up pizza during the time when the game was being assembled, and they returned at about 11:55, and we had a 30-minute lunch break. I had ordered four pizzas, and they came with two orders of cinnamon bread sticks. I thought this would be more than enough, but it was gone in less time than I imagined. Luckily, everyone felt they had enough to eat and drink, so it worked out not to have extras left and money wasted.

After lunch, we went back to work and added the hinges to the sections of the Gaga ball pit. We made sure to pre-drill holes so no wood would be split and attached each hinge. What we didn't realize is that there was a top and bottom for each of the hinges, so after we were done, we found that about half of the hinges needed to be removed and replaced the correct side up. Mr.

Kinner made a hinge pin remover out of a long nail he had in his supplies so that it would be much easier for anyone needing to take the gaga pit apart to do so.

While the finishing touches were being put on the Gaga ball pit, we got out the pieces for the Nine Square in the Air. Several volunteers moved over to help set up this game, and it took about 10 minutes to figure out where the pieces went and get the whole game put together. After both games were completely put together, we took the opportunity to test them out. First, we tried out the Gaga ball pit. We played several rounds, and the game worked very well with no problems. Then we played the nine-square game. We were able to get everyone involved in this game, including all the adults who were there. This game was very nice, and the pieces held up very well. None of the connector pieces came loose during gameplay.











Safety Issues and Actions

We had no safety incidents or injuries on either workday. The main danger during the Project was the miter saw, which I had all volunteers under the age of 18 stay a safe distance from. I made sure that anyone sanding or cutting wood had work gloves so that they wouldn't get splinters. More gloves were available for anyone who needed to use them. I had safety glasses on hand for anyone to use. My brother didn't use them, even though he was the one using the miter saw, because he wears glasses and can not see if he takes his prescription glasses off. I also had disposable gloves in use during the staining process; however, Henry did get covered in wood stain and has reported that it took several weeks for the stain to wear off.

Minor changes to the Project

The main change that was made to the Project was to purchase the Nine Square in the Air game instead of making it ourselves. The reason I decided to do this was because a large discount was offered by the company that makes the connector pieces that I was going to purchase. When I found out about the discount, I researched the pros and cons of making the game versus purchasing the deluxe game kit. Since the cutting of the PVC pipe would take only one volunteer about 30 minutes to complete, I decided that the work time should be a concern. I discussed this change with my parents and showed them my pro/con list, and they agreed that I should purchase the kit because it would be the best thing for the OBHC. The biggest issue was money, so I worked hard to save money in all the ways I could and ended up having enough money to purchase the kit and do all the other aspects of the Project.

Significant changes in project results

I believe that purchasing the Nine Square in the Air game changed the Project results in a very positive way since the game will be much easier to play with different groups of people, as well as being more sturdy and easier to assemble and store. The rest of the Project resulted in what I had originally anticipated.

Leadership Skills

Workday Leadership/Supervisory Activities

On each project day, I decided where things would be set up, how the Project should proceed, and who would be assigned to each part of the Project. During work time, I kept checking in on each person to make sure they were doing the work correctly and that they didn't have any questions, moving people around to different jobs if needed. I did my best to put each person in a job where their strengths would be utilized. I also asked for help from the adults present when needed.

Workday Problems and Solutions

The main problem I had was the hinges I purchased on Amazon not coming in on time. They were set to arrive during the middle of the week before the workday when they were needed, but the tracking continued to say they were delayed. I decided on Friday night not to wait and see if they would come in the mail on Saturday but to go to Lowe's and find another option. I am very happy I did this because the hinges I purchased from Lowe's ended up being a much better option because the Amazon hinges were not as advertised. Also, I was able to see that the screws that came with the hinges were too long for my application and get screws that would work. The hinges that came from Amazon didn't end up coming with screws.

The other problem was that I forgot to put balls for the Gaga ball pit on my list of things to purchase. I decided to send my mom to Walmart during the construction of the Project, and she was able to find the balls and bring them back for the end of the Project.

On the second workday, we had a little trouble with measuring the wood. Because none of us are very good at woodworking (yet) we didn't realize that on the ruler, there was a space before the measurements started, and the first measurements were off. I was happy that Mr. Kinner told us that we should measure twice and cut once, so I had the volunteers measure after the boards were marked, but before they were cut, the issue was caught, and the cuts were made in the correct spots.

Comparison of Projected and Actual Workday Schedules

I projected that we would be working into the afternoon on the first workday; however, things didn't take as long as I anticipated. From my experience with staining, I thought that it would take much longer to do the stain than it did. I hadn't realized that since the pieces were smaller, it would make that much of a difference. This ended up being a good thing because since we were done right at lunchtime, everyone went their own ways, and I was able to save the money that was going to be spent on food, which ended up helping me purchase the Nine Square in the Air game.

Comparison of Estimated Effort with Timesheet Summary

As previously stated, I overestimated the time it would take to stain the pieces for the Giant Block Stacking Game on the first workday, so work was done by noon instead of later. On the second workday, we worked until lunch, took a 30-minute break to eat and rest, then worked again until 2 p.m. After we were done working, we took time to play each of the games and make sure that they worked. Overall, I believe that the effort I estimated pretty closely matched what actually happened. I was grateful to have Trailmen and friends who were hard workers and who I could move to another job when they had finished the job that had been assigned. I initially thought it would take around 10-12 hours to complete this Project and have a total of about 94 hours worked between my volunteers, adult leaders, and myself. My timesheets show that we worked for 11 hours, and the total hours worked were 109.25.

Leadership Lessons Learned

During this Project, I learned that with proper planning, the workday would go very smoothly. I am lucky to be the youngest child in my family, and I was able to watch my sister and brother work through their Stars & Stripes and Freedom projects, so I was aware of how much work there would be and how much planning was going to need to be done. I have been watching my parents lead in Trail Life and AHG, as well as watching my older siblings, and I feel like because of this, many of the leadership lessons have become an ingrained part of me before I began this Project.

Project Benefits

Benefits/Longevity

The OBHC will benefit from this Project by having three games that can be played indoors or outdoors. I met with Brent Parsons, the executive director after the Project was completed to show him what we had done, and he said that these would be used often and be of great help, especially during times when moms were in classes so that the kids would have a safe and fun place to play. These games should last for many years to come if properly stored in inclement weather. They were made of quality materials that were meant to be outdoors during most times of the year.

Project Lessons Learned

On the first workday, when the box was being made, the wood was split twice as the screws were being drilled in. With the help of Mr. Kinner, we determined that the best course of action was to drill pilot holes before setting the screws. This knowledge helped on the second workday when hinges needed to be installed on the Gaga ball pit. I knew to have the volunteers drill pilot holes before attempting to drill the screws.

Personal Spiritual Life Benefits

The most difficult part of this Project for me was the fundraising. I was stressed and uncomfortable about asking for money and found this portion of the Project an area that made me spend more time praying and asking God to provide. I know that God did provide for my Project because, even though there were fewer people who attended my fundraiser, and it seemed like less was collected, in the end, there was just enough to complete the Project. I am grateful for God's provision, and I can clearly see His hand at work in my Project.

Conclusion

Advice for other Candidates

My advice for others is don't procrastinate; start on the experiences and badges as early as possible. I have had plenty of time to work on my Servant Leadership Project, but before my brother began working on his Freedom Award since he was the first in our troop, we didn't know about the experiences, so I didn't get started early. I am happy that Trail Life has recently

changed some of the requirements for the ranks so that Trailmen will get to know about the experiences much earlier on.

Impact of Trail Life on My Life

Trail Life has definitely helped me develop leadership and public speaking skills. I have had the privilege of being the First Officer of our troop during three different time periods. The first time I was First Officer, I thought I would for sure not be able to do the job. I was terrified to get up and speak in front of the group, but my parents forced me to do it, and I found out that I could do it. This has impacted my life in all areas. I have so much more confidence than I would have ever had without Trail Life. I have also made some great friends that I believe will be my friends for life.

I have also learned patience. As new boys have joined our troop over the years, sometimes there is a younger boy who is not mature and is quite annoying. I have seen several of these boys grow up and become men whom I am friends with. This helps me remember when new boys come that, they will also grow up, and if I am patient with them, I can be part of helping them mature.

Trail Life has also impacted my life because I got to spend so much time with my dad and brother. This has given us so many memories and times that I will always value. I have learned that I love camping and cooking outdoors, which will stay with me for all my life. I've gotten to have my dad as my leader for many years, and I have learned many leadership lessons by watching him.

None of this would have been possible without my dad, who has supported and encouraged me all the way through Trail Life, serving as my leader and working very hard to make sure the program is a great learning experience for not just my brother and me, but also all the other boys involved.
